Rural Disparities Topic of Discussion at TEROC Meeting

The Tobacco Education & Research Oversight Committee (TEROC) invited the California Tobacco Prevention Program (CTPP), the Tobacco-Related Disease Research Program (TRDRP) and the California Department of Education's Tobacco Use Prevention Education (CDE-TUPE) program to present on Tobacco Prevention, Education, and Research in Rural California. Their desired outcome was to learn program activities to address tobacco issues in rural jurisdictions from each agency. RISE Project Director, Shelly Brantley, was grateful to be invited by CTPP to be part of their presentation on rural disparities.

TEROC, the legislatively mandated advisory committee, is charged with overseeing the use of Proposition 99 and Proposition 56 tobacco tax revenues for tobacco control and prevention education and for tobacco-related research.

Along with a team of CTPP staff, Shelly made the case for why rural is a priority population that needs special attention and resources when it comes to prevention and policy work. The Committee was most appreciative of all they learned and welcomed input on how they can help our rural communities succeed.

TEROC recently released their bi-annual strategic plan, <u>Achieving Health Equity: Standing Together Against Commercial Tobacco & Nicotine, 2025–2026</u>. The first objective in this plan is to <u>reduce tobacco-related disparities</u>, recognizing "the tobacco industry and its deadly products impact communities at different rates."



Latest Bulletin on Flavor Ban

Assembly Bill 3218 expanded the definition of "tobacco products" to include nicotine analogs. Products covered by this definition likely include packaging that states the product is "nicotine free" or "not subject to FDA regulation" and purports to provide a nicotine-like experience. Such products
